Beacon Pathway learning from study tour to Vancouver, Portland and Seattle

Beacon's study tour in July 2015 was the opportunity for 20 New Zealanders to experience successful medium density solutions in both suburban and inner city settings. Here are five key things they think New Zealand should take on board.

- Make the most of opportunities (especially large scale brownfield) – they lead to success
- In addressing affordability, think about long term rental and different models of tenure
- Pursue institutional investment in large scale rental
- Always think about transport, infrastructure, housing and land use together
- Embrace medium and higher density but also think about new types of lower density living such as pocket neighbourhoods.

What Works is a new website that helps people, especially smaller community groups, to show the value of their work. It provides tools to help gather robust data and information to tell a real story about

Residential tenancies amendment bill

Last week CHA, along with NZCCSS, prepared a submission on the RTA amendment bill. You can read the submission and our press release [here](#).

The submissions of Beacon Pathway and **NZGreen Building Council** also provide evidence for these regulations to move in a more robust direction.

We are turning our focus to the submission to MBIE on the RTA regulations due **11 February**. Because of time constraints we are preparing submissions based on what we have heard our members saying for sometime- please let us know if we're on the right track.

A [research paper](#) written by Phillipa Howden-Chapman et al looks at the 2015 budget and its significance for social housing and provides some very good information around the housing warrant of fitness.

[Another paper](#) worth a look at is a paper by Sarah Bierre, Mark Bennett, and Philippa Howden-Chapman. They pointed out that our law on residential tenancies requires rental homes to be "free of dampness". And yet, the dampness standard was not mentioned in the Government's guide to renters' rights or in the standard tenancy agreement.

Congratulations to the Chinese New Settlers Services Trust (CNSST). On 12 February the CNSST will begin construction on their new social housing project in Panmure, Auckland. CNSST support Asian new settlers and the community in New Zealand. Their new project is a four story apartment building with 36 one bedroom units on the top three levels. The ground level of the building will be used by CNSST as an office to provide wrap-around support to the residents and wider community. The building will provide social affordable rental housing to local lower income families including Asian seniors
