Housing and wellbeing: making the connections



CHA Deputy Chief Executive Chris Glaudel reflects on two conferences in the past week that joined the dots between good housing and wellbeing.

Both the Ageing Well National Science Challenge conference and the Child Poverty Action Group 2019 Summit provided strong reminders of the connection between housing and other areas of people's lives: as you all know, housing is essential for wellbeing but can't be viewed in isolation.

The Ageing Well conference presented research specifically on the critical role of housing in wellbeing for Māori and Pacific households, and for older people. This research looked at their mental health and wellbeing, their perceptions of safety and so on, and contrasted this with how people felt when they were living in poor housing, homes that were cold, too expensive to heat, or unsafe. Not surprisingly, when folks reported that their homes were affordable, easy to

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maintain and comfortable, their wellbeing indicators were much better.

A few days later the Child Poverty Action Group summit in Wellington convened a number of stimulating discussions around the following central question: when it comes to reducing child poverty, where to from here?

Again, the answer to that question was not simple. Being housed well was essential to any meaningful attempt to address child poverty, but more was also needed. It was heartening to see a number of community housing providers in the audience and/or presenting at the Summit, including Moira Lawler, Chief Executive of Lifewise, and John Zois, a beneficiary advocate and peer support volunteer with Lifewise who has lived experience of homelessness and surviving on a benefit.

They talked about the work they were doing to address homelessness, which also included building the life skills and suppports people needed to transition into paid work but doing it in a respectful manner that did not expect people to go from living on the streets into a 40-hour a week desk job. They were very mindful of the realities of people's lives. It was especially great to have John Zois there as someone who lived on the streets for a decade and is now an outreach worker, able to bring his own lived experience to his interactions with people experiencing homelessness.

One of the things that came through strongly from this conference session was to do with the penalties that come into play when someone is transitioning from welfare into work. The settings are out of date and well overdue for adjustment. In addition, it was possible for people to end up in a less secure situation financially once things like having to pay for rent, a phone and electricity – to name a few – were taken into account. The stability of having a home doesn't automatically translate into economic stability when you have experienced homelessness for a long time. We need to change that.

CHPs are doing amazing work in this area. We need to keep trying to understand the pressures and barriers built into our current welfare system so that we can advocate effectively to change them, so that people are able to realise their full potential.

Using inclusionary zoning to provide affordable housing

CHA Chief Executive Scott Figenshow argues inclusionary zoning is an essential tool for councils looking to increase affordable housing in their communities. He makes the case for the benefits of inclusionary zoning in a podcast interview with Thomas Simonson from Local Government New Zealand.

Scott says it's about councils using the planning system to their advantage. Every time a council approves a new development, resulting in a significant increase in the land value, it makes sense to ensure some of that value is able to be used for community services, including affordable housing.

Historically New Zealand has prioritised its finance tools, such as the state housing programme or state advance loans, over use of the planning system to provide affordable housing, which is defined internationally as requiring no more than a third of income in rent or mortgage payments.

He says one of the most important things councils can do is to understand the housing need in their communities and where it sits on the housing continuum from emergency shelter through to assisted rentals and pathways into home ownership. This involves finding out, for instance, how many people are experiencing homelessness in the council's area, how many households are in paid work but cannot afford to rent or own a home, how many people are living with high needs, and so on.

Rent arrears assistance

The Ministry of Social Development has advised of a new option to help people stay in their homes when their tenancy is at risk because of overdue rent.

A new Rent Arrears Assistance payment is now available from MSD, which the Ministry says may be able to help some people who don't already qualify for other MSD rent arrears support.

Changes to the Residential Tenancies Act

The Government has announced a suite of changes to the Residential Tenancies Act that Associate Housing Minister (Public Housing) Kris Faafoi says will give tenants greater security in their rentals.

The changes include limiting rent increases to once a year, removing a landlord's right to use no-cause terminations, and letting tenants make minor changes to make their rental properties safer and more liveable.

Since then, Housing First has been implemented across many elements of the crisis response and homeless systems and is being successfully applied in diverse interventions and as an overall community approach to addressing homelessness.
