Community Housing Sector awaits Wellbeing Budget 2019

The first Wellbeing Budget will be released this Thursday, 30 May. Expectations are high across many sectors for new or increased levels of funding. Community housing is no exception. A warm, safe and dry affordable home is the foundation for wellbeing.

The pre-budget announcement of nearly \$200 million over four years to expand and support Housing First is a welcome start. We are concerned that too much is being spent on responding to families in crisis rather than ramping up affordable supply to ensure crisis are prevented.

In the quarter ending 31 March nearly \$70 million was spent on the Temporary Additional Support and Emergency Housing Special Needs Grant; a similar investment into permanently affordable supply is needed. We eagerly await announcements to signal the shift from crisis response to prevention.

HUD Report Confirms CHP Ability to Deliver

Community Housing Providers delivered 60% (928 of 1,546 total) of the new public housing tenancies for the year ended 31 March 2019. Since gaining access to Income Related Rent supported tenancies 5 years ago, CHPs have gone from zero to 6,172 tenancies representing 9% of total supply. This has been accomplished through a combination of new builds, leasing and redirects.

In responding to homelessness, community organisations are also delivering in greater numbers. The Housing First programme placed 199 new households in just the last quarter, bringing their total currently housed to 720. Community organisations are also supporting another 2,697 households in Transitional Housing.

In addition to the public housing tenancies, Housing First, and Transitional Housing places, community housing organisations also provide another 7,000 affordable rental and ownership homes, meaning over 16,000 New Zealand families have a roof over their heads as a result of your work.

More unsold Kiwibuy houses brought by Govt

The first was in April for five homes in Wanaka's Northlake development.

Now lack of sales in Mike Greer's development in Canterbury and Auckland means the government has had to buy back seven more.

As a way to encourage developers to work with the government to build Kiwibuild homes, the Crown provides an underwrite. If the houses remain unsold after 60 days, the developer can trigger the underwrite and require the government to buy them back at a discounted price.

Kiwibuild would not disclose the price for the seven houses, saying it was commercially sensitive.

Four are in Auckland, and three in Canterbury.

A Kiwibuild spokesperson said the programme should be looked at in its entirety, for example strong sales in Tauranga.

But he said the whole Mike Greer development, with 104 houses in total, won't be affected by the underwrite trigger, and will proceed.
