### Building a model for alternative procurement or commissioning

CHA asked Deloitte to assist with setting out an alternative model for community housing provider involvement in stock transfers that delivers on several fronts:

- · a local response to delivery
- · improved tenant choice across the housing continuum
- · increases supply of both social and affordable housing
- and is phased to support provider growth and builds capacity.

This is a two-stage project. <u>The first stage report: 'Structuring</u> <u>Options' is available on the website here.</u> The survey of the seven organisations on the CHA Council were thought to represent a range of providers. A key conclusion is that the majority of community housing providers surveyed were not interested in the transactions currently on offer and that participating in risky transactions with uncertain financial outcomes was not considered appealing.

Surely there must be a better way.

Stage two of the Deloitte work involves outlining what an alternative approach could look like while complying with Government rules of sourcing. Initial thought is that it would seek recognition of the CHRA registration as a panel of suppliers and set out how that could work in practical terms. We are currently scoping this work and it is outlined on Page 12 of the report. We look forward to your feedback to help us in our engagment with Government to find workable solutions.

CHA submission on proposed National Policy Statement on Urban Development Capacity (NPS-UDC)

The purpose of the proposed National Policy Statement on Urban Development Capacity (NPS-UDC) is to ensure regional and district plans provide adequately for the development of business and housing. ## Housing certification achieved



Congratulations to Liz Kemp of Dwell Housing for receiving Housing Professional certification through the Australasian Housing Institute accreditation process. AHI is the professional association of people working in the multi-disciplinary social housing industry in Australia and New Zealand.

Liz said the certification recognises the hard work put in by social housing professionals and highlights professionalism in the industry. For her to become accredited she had to be a member of AHI and to gain continuing professional development (CPD) points by attending seminars, housing events and completing housing related training. Her eight years of experience in social housing also contributed.

"The process is straight forward and it's easy to upload documents to gain points towards accreditation on AHI's website. AHI are helpful and come back quickly if they need further information," Liz says.

The one difficulty though, is the lack of relevant tertiary industry qualifications in New Zealand making it difficult to achieve level 3. *"That being said it's great to reach level 1 and I'm investigating training options to reach level 2 and 3."*

# Transfer of social housing in Horowhenua proceeding to market sounding

The Horowhenua District Council (HDC) and the Government are jointly undertaking a market sounding to seek feedback from community housing providers interested in delivering social and affordable housing in the Horowhenua District and Otaki. The information, released on GETS on 19 July, can be accessed <u>here under ID 17704791.</u>

This market sounding relates to the transfer of HDC's 115 community housing properties and 249 of Housing New Zealand Corporation properties. Those who register as participants through GETS will be invited to the market sounding meetings in Levin (28 July) and Wellington (29 July) with Government and HDC officials and advisors.

### **Cross-party homelessness inquiry**

People who are homeless, those who were once homeless, those working with the homeless and concerned New Zealanders are being asked to share their experiences and solutions to this growing issue with the cross-party homelessness inquiry of Labour, Māori and Green Parties. Submissions will initially be heard at four locations: Te Puea Marae in Auckland, Tauranga, Wellington and Christchurch between the end of August and early September. <u>Read more here.</u>

#### WCC Council tenants tell tales on radio (and in a book)

Maria's heart was beating fast. "What have I done, there is a stranger in my house!" This is the gripping opening of an audio drama written by a first-time author and a resident living in a Wellington City Council Housing unit. It is one of five pieces created by City Housing tenants, in a project developed and facilitated by Voice Arts and featured on RNZ National's Nine to Noon readings 20 to 24 June.

Small Windows on Big Stories is the name of the project. The stories, which offer diverse, touching and humorous perspectives, are fictional, yet based on real experiences of settling into New Zealand and into social housing. The project aims to increase understanding about people from other cultures by giving glimpses into the lives of tenants who have migrated to New Zealand, whether as skilled migrants, refugees, or to join family. First written for radio, the stories have been adapted into a book with a foreword by Nine to Noon presenter Kathryn Ryan and an introduction from Wellington Mayor Celia Wade-Brown. ### Research

#### 1. Transforming public housing in a federal context

This is the first research report from the AHURI Inquiry into Australia's affordable housing industry capacity. This research examined the transformation of public housing in four federal states: Austria, Germany, Canada and the USA and found Austria to be a leading example of a sustainable affordable housing industry.

# 2. Private rental brokerage programs in housing outcomes for vulnerable Australians

<u>This research</u> explored Australian private rental brokerage programmes which provide assistance in securing and sustaining

private rental tenancies for disadvantaged tenants. The research identified a diverse range of activities tailored to individuals and local circumstances, but lacking common terminology, measures and reporting making it difficult to assess the overall success of these programmes beyond specific programme outcomes.

#### 3. Massey University Housing Affordability report June 2016

In the latter months of 2015, Massey University reported an improvement in home affordability across the nation. This trend has continued. However, the past three months to June show a significant reversal (9.2%). The NZ median house price in May last year was \$460,000 and even though a year later this increased by \$46,000, actual affordability improved by 6%. The region that shows a noteworthy annual and quarterly decline in affordability is Central Otago Lakes (19.6% and 22.5% respectively), and to a lesser extent Waikato/Bay of Plenty (2.5% and 1.7%).

Housing affordability has been assessed by comparing the average weekly earnings with the median dwelling price and the mortgage interest rate. The earnings figure represents the money available to the family, or household unit, and the median dwelling price combined with the mortgage interest rates provide an indicator of the expense involved.
