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### **Background**



The vision of the Waimahia Inlet development is: a great place to live with quality affordable housing in a healthy, diverse and strong community. Placemaking forms a core part of this vision.

The development was created by Tāmaki Makaurau Community Housing. This is a partnership between Ngā Mana Whenua o Tāmaki Makaurau - Tāmaki Collective, Housing Foundation, Auckland and Onehunga Hostel Endowment Trust and CORT Community Housing.

The Resident Association, which is extremely active at Waimahia, is supported by the Partnership financially and via staff resources. The aim of this is to help build a safe, secure and welcoming community with a shared sense of values.

The Partnership wish to use the Living Well survey tool (previously developed by NZ Housing Foundation) to measure quality of life at Waimahia Inlet.

### Research Objectives

- The overall objective of the research is to determine if quality of life has improved (or not) since moving into Waimahia. Specifically, how has life changed in the following areas:
  - Employment
  - Housing costs
  - Financial stress
  - Financial behaviour
  - Expectations about longer-term financial position
  - Health
  - Education of school age children
  - Sense of community and participation
  - Perceptions of safety
  - Connection with family and friends
  - · Opportunity for exercise
  - Housing suitability and Crowding

### **Research Method**

### **KEY INSIGHTS**



- The Waimahia development has been very successful in improving the quality of life for its residents.
- Nearly all indicators have improved with 53% saying that overall quality of life has improved (compared with just 7% who had a better quality of life before Waimahia).
- Compared with Glen Eden, the financial impact of increased housing costs is more contained with housing costs as a % of gross household income well under the 40% threshold.
- As with Glen Eden, the move towards home ownership has made a big impact on residents perceptions of future financial prospects (70% see the move as having improved long term financial prospects).
- The one surprising and disappointing result concerns residents perceptions of crime.
   Previous neighbourhoods were rated "Crime free" (Excellent or very good) by 37% of the residents compared with just 10% similar ratings at Waimahia. Clearly, crime perceptions will need to be a focus for the future.
- Perceptions of the area as a "safe neighbourhood" however, were similar for before and at Waimahia.



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



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

Income









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



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

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


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

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



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



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

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


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## Neighbourhood events helping to build relationships with neighbours

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

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

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

#### Attendance before moving to Waimhaia









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# Appendix: Key themes in the Open Ended comments

## Please tell us in your own words what moving to Waimahia has meant to you and your household, and why? Key themes

#### Enable us to own our home

"The move has been life changing, I never believed we would make it on the housing market."

"It has given me and my family an investment for life and set a foundation for my kids to grow up in and cherish."

"Moving to Waimahia has meant my partner and myself now have the opportunity to buy our home with the help of housing foundation and raise our son and future children in a awesome community."

"It has been a blessing to be given the opportunity for my family to own our own home, especially when I'm the sole bread winner in the family. I am very thankful."

### Feel part of a community

"The community is tight knitted, everyone keeps an eye out for one another and the people are lovely."

"It's a step in the right direction for my family and I to grow in a like minded community. Dreams are possible, they are now a reality."

"I love knowing my neighbours and the sense of belonging that is here."

"Our household is just grateful to be able to live in a newly built home in a community where we feel safe & surrounded by neighbours who look after each other."

### Whole family benefited

"Moving to Waimahia has strengthen my family to become more motivated as a family and grateful for life."

"This is important to us because we want stability for our children and a place we can make memories as our family grows. Both my husband and I are eldest children in our families and we are the first of our generation to have the opportunity to own our own home. This home will be a stepping stone for our children to one day own their own home with their families."

### Security of tenure

"We have peace of mind of going to be here for long period of time. Less stress for our landlord that he will sell their house."

"It's much more stable because it's our own home as opposed to renting from someone else."

"Stability - knowing that we will one day own the house we are renting."

### Financially secure

"Owning our own home in Waimahia has meant a huge deal for us, we feel financially secure."

"A step.. no a leap up! in the financial side of our lives."

"It has given me the opportunity to seriously commit financially to saving paying off debt."

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## And if you could change one thing to improve life in the Waimahia community, what would you change? Key

### Better/ More Parking

"People parking across footpaths and crossings - as a regular walker with pram and dog it's very dangerous to have to constantly walk onto the road to get around cars. Also people don't use the garages for car and they end up on grass verges and lawns and make neighbourhood look terrible."

"Parking, parking, parking! the amount of bay parking and carparks on our property:)"

"Parking allotted for each household - not just first come first served but a definite one or two spaces depending on the rooms of the house."

### **Better Facilities**

"Hurry the parks along and finish the walkway."

"Build more parks for children to play plus seats in more trees for parents to sit an watch them."

"Sports park for the kids like basketball/ netball minicourts. it will be nice to have a walk path/ short way to Maihia from basin."

### Security and Safety

"The security around here, the break ins and behaviour that happens around here is disgusting. Not our Waimahia community but outsiders, around our area."

"Some of the bylaws to improve security measures fencing in the front, home alarm system with external siren."

"Improve the security within the community by making it a gated community, install CCTV allow us to fence the house completely."

"Local school and cafe within the community as it is not one of the safer suburbs outside of Waimahia inlet."

#### Crime

"The break ins and behaviour that happens around here is disgusting. Not our Waimahia community but outsiders, around our area. I have called police so many times I'm sure they know my number. Seeing people beating each other up outside our house on the main road. car accidents. Break ins, street brawls. It's horrible."

"Our HNZ neighbour behind us. We have had to call the police numerous times, the police chase them through our yard regularly and warn us to keep everything locked and that there are prolific car thieves. These people need kicking out! "

"Being able to have small fencing at the front that might detour thieves from steeling shoes, plans, solar lights brooms."

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## What are the main things that you like about living in the Waimahia community? Key themes

### Sense of Community

"This community living reminds me of my childhood where everyone took pride in their properties and respected the neighbourhood. The kiwi warmth no matter race culture or age is acknowledged and again respected."

"The fact that most of the families have moved into the neighbourhood with the goal of home ownership. This is a great factor because it indicates that most of the people we are surrounded by are hard working and family orientated. We also appreciate community events and the opportunities that are created to meet others."

"Knowing what's going on in the community through the Facebook page, neighbours and residents being vigilant about what's happening, effort to bring people closer together, people expressing willingness to help."

"A community where people know each other and have a common desire to make a safer and family friendly place."

#### **New Homes**

"Finally a place to call home, warm house, my family finally have their own room especially the children."

"Being home owners for the first time to this lovely, warm and new house."

"We own our home - our family live close by - affordable - dry homes (my son doesn't have breathing issues anymore)."

"New housing making it look clean and tidy."

#### Safe and Secure

"We know most of our neighbours in the street which makes us feel secure."

"I like the community feel and that my neighbours are in similar positions to each other and look out for each other."

"We know most of our neighbours in the street which makes us feel secure."

"I like that even though it's a stone throw away from troubled streets, I just don't feel that sort of presences. It feels safe, the security, neighbours, the way houses are designed. Everyone here is looking out for each other."

"I love that everyone is dedicated to ensuring that our community is safe."

"I feel safer for Neighbourhood Watch."

### Walkways and green spaces

"We love being near the water and reserve walk."

"The beauty of it (homes and our surroundings), and how it encourages better living in all aspects. Community gardens, energy efficient, water saving, parks and walkways which encourages us as a community to get outside."

"Plenty of green space."

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
