Research

1. Severe housing deprivation in Aotearoa/New Zealand 2001-2013

More than half of all homeless adults in New Zealand are working or studying, say University of Otago, Wellington (UOW) researchers in their analysis of the 'severely housing deprived' population, using census and administrative data.

In 2013, more than half (52 per cent) of homeless adults were working, studying, or both, up from 49 per cent in 2006," Dr Amore says. The research shows that the severely housing deprived or 'homeless' population has grown in size and scale over the last three censuses, at an accelerating rate. The prevalence of homelessness grew by 15 per cent between the 2006 and 2013 censuses, compared with a 9 per cent increase between 2001 and 2006. See the report here.

2. Request for information on Youth Housing Provision

A small group of organisations are providing housing for vulnerable young people (16-21 years) in Christchurch. This has been a challenging experience with some valuable lessons learnt. Before taking the next step these organisations want to explore the variety of models for youth housing currently operating, or that have operated in the recent past, in Aotearoa/ New Zealand and overseas.

The Wayne Francis Charitable Trust has agreed to fund a scoping exercise that The Collaborative, a research group specialising in working with young people, will be undertaking. 3. Elinor Chisholm and the rights of renters

Half of New Zealanders rent the home they live in, often experiencing insecure tenure and poor quality housing. So what can we do about it?

In July, Radio New Zealand asked this question to Elinor Chisholm, Research Fellow at the University of Otago, Wellington who has recently completed a PhD looking at individual and collective action for healthy housing in New Zealand. She says, <u>here</u>, the low limits of the accommodation supplement aren't helping renters who are the ones really losing out in this housing crisis.

Elinor Chisholm's Phd research shows that tenant representation can support health by helping tenants access secure, affordable, and quality housing. But tenants are limited in their ability to represent themselves.

The health disadvantages of tenants are inextricably linked to their power disadvantages. At an individual level, housing insecurity makes asserting their rights, as the legislation requires them to do, a risky endeavour, especially for low-income people.

At the political level, group representation by tenants is limited by resource constraints and policies that make home-ownership the rational option for anyone who can afford to. The thesis makes the case that improving tenant health requires interventions that account for power disparities, and suggests that tenants are important allies in working towards healthier housing.

Poor foundations - full story: testing homes for meth gone awry



The NZ Drug Foundation say that the current noise around testing of housing for the presence of methamphetamine (meth or P) is based on a miss-interpretation of Ministry of Health guidelines.

They note the Ministry guidelines were never intended for testing for the presence of chemicals after meth is used. The standard being used is set at a level 25-30x too low according to Massey chemist Dr Nick Kim. He advocates for a safe level of meth residue: *"I wouldn't* go up to the number I've mentioned of 12.5, but I could imagine a number of 3.0 micrograms per 100 cm2 or six times the current guideline."

Meanwhile, across New Zealand tenants are losing their homes and possessions – or receiving debilitating bills – because their houses are found to be meth contaminated. In this article <u>here</u>, Russell

Brown looks at this situation that is putting vulnerable people out onto the street.

New standard on the testing and remediation of methamphetaminecontaminated properties — progress update

The committee developing the new standard (NZS 8510) held its third meeting on 23 August 2016 in Wellington. They heard from two guest presenters, considered comments on the first working draft of the standard and discussed further developments on key parts of the standard being prepared by the five working groups of the committee. Consultation on the recommended standards will progress towards the end of the year.
