Social housing changes confirmed for 14 April 2014

Changes to New Zealand's social housing sector, announced in this year's Budget, were confirmed on 20 November 2013. Parliament passed legislation enabling the transfer of housing assessments and associated functions from Housing New Zealand to the Ministry of Social Development on 14 April 2014. It also confirmed that from April 2014, incomerelated rent subsidies will be available for new eligible tenants of registered community housing providers. To date this has only been available to Housing New Zealand.

The Government's vision for social housing, announced in December 2010, is a diverse supply of homes in a social housing sector that is responsive to changing demands. The aim is to help those with greatest need while supporting more people to move to private rental or home ownership.

Transferring housing assessments to the Ministry of Social Development is an important step in realising that vision. The transfer of functions ensures people's eligibility and needs for social housing are assessed independently of the agencies that will provide the housing.

The change will also enable the Ministry to have a more comprehensive view of its clients' needs. Housing is a basic need – it impacts on health, education, connection to community, and employment. Adding housing assessments to employment and financial support will mean the Ministry has the potential to make an even bigger difference to people who most need support.

Until 14 April, Housing New Zealand will continue to conduct housing needs assessments. After 14 April, Housing New Zealand will continue to be a landlord to state housing tenants and be the main provider of social housing in New Zealand.

We will be providing more information in the New Year. This will include social housing briefings for community housing providers, beneficiary and tenancy advocates and other interested stakeholders in Auckland, Wellington and Christchurch. These will be an opportunity to receive some detail on housing needs assessments and how to receive an income-related rent subsidy.

The Ministry of Business, Innovation and Employment will also be consulting on the regulations that will apply for community housing providers and provide information on how to become a registered community housing provider.
